Councilman Shea stated that John Sussmeier was the anchor of the CAC, and has been on this Council for 13 years. He added that the CAC will truly miss John's expertise.

RESOLUTION #183-07

The following Resolution was presented by Councilwoman Budney, seconded by Councilman Hosmer and unanimously carried;

RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby authorizes Town Clerk Merando to submit the appropriate Individual Program Application to the New York State Office of Children and Family Services as required for securing the funds for calendar year 2008.

3. Resolution requesting retailers to reduce overall tobacco advertising in their place of business.

RESOLUTION #184-07

The following Resolution was presented by Councilman Brower, seconded by Councilwoman Budney and unanimously carried;

Non-Binding

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WHEREAS, tobacco use kills over 25,000 New Yorkers every year, and is the leading preventable cause of death in our communities; and

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General has concluded that tobacco advertising contributes to youth smoking rates; and

WHEREAS, each year tobacco companies spent \$15.4 billion to market cigarettes in the United States, including \$516 million in New York; and

WHEREAS, over 24,900 youths under age 18 in New York State become new daily smokers each year; and

WHEREAS, 3 out of 4 teenagers shop in convenience stores at least once per week; and

WHEREAS, tobacco advertising in retail stores has a powerful influence on teens who are significantly more likely to smoke due to advertising than they are due to peer pressure; and

WHEREAS, research shows that youth are more than twice as likely as adults to recall tobacco advertising; and

WHEREAS, outdoor and exterior-facing tobacco ads at retail stores are often seen by students walking to and from school; and

WHEREAS, retail stores are an integral and valuable part of our community;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Philipstown hereby partners with POW'R Against Tobacco in requesting that retailers reduce overall tobacco advertising in their place of business and eliminate tobacco advertising from areas likely to be seen by children, including exterior poles, walls, windows facing "out," interior wall space below five feet, near candy displays, and on counter tops; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Philipstown hereby encourages law enforcement agencies throughout to take appropriate measures to ensure all local, state and federal laws regarding all signage are observed.

4. Resolution authorizing Supervisor Mazzuca to sign the 2007 Justice Court Assistance Program Grant for court security/cameras, updated law books, and recording devices.

RESOLUTION #185-07

The following Resolution was presented by Councilman Hosmer, seconded by Councilwoman Budney and unanimously carried;

Councilwoman Budney announced that she will secure the date of the cleanup, which should be sometime in October.

6. Resolution needed to hire Christine McGrath Muscat as Secretary to the Conservation Advisory Council.

Supervisor Mazzuca stated that the Town Board had discussed increasing the hourly salary for this position as an incentive. The pay rate has been \$10.00 per hour; however, they feel that this amount should increase to \$14.00.

RESOLUTION #187-07

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Board to consider a resolution to have the affidavit retracted or supplement it with a letter from the Judge, stating that opinion was out of Richard Goldsand and not necessarily this Town Board.

Richard Charles, resident of Foundry Pond Road, began saying that as Mr. Weinpahl described, this issue goes back more than two years ago, and when first presented to the Planning Board as a subdivision, they had some significant comments on the development and how it should be changed. The application for the subdivision was withdrawn and then a few years later returned to the Planning Board. The neighbors on Foundry Pond Road still see the new submission as just a bad development as originally submitted. It then went before the Zoning Board, who also recognized this as a bad project, saw deficiencies in it and referred it to the Planning Board. He noted that one of the Zoning Board members were so outraged, he describe it as one of the worst developments he had ever seen, and was particularly outraged at the way DeVido had played games with the zoning law, and the fact he was playing games by taking the access to the dam, saying he now has enough property for a four lot subdivision.

Mr. Charles pointed out that the residents are continuing to spend monies objecting to this bad development and as Mr. Weinpahl stated, "we had a victory in the court." The Courts stated that any subdivision needs to go before the Planning Board and would apply in Mr. DeVido's application. In short, the three-lot subdivision would be required to go before the Planning Board as per the new law. Mr. Charles expressed dissatisfaction with Mr. Goldsand's submission of the most recent affidavit without consent from the Town Board, which states the effective date is perspective and doesn't apply to his property. If everybody is in agreement and we have found a way to get this project back to the Planning Board where it was two years ago, and heavily criticized, he believes that this project needs to be before the Planning Board where it can be checked out and carefully considered.

Supervisor Mazzuca corrected Mr. Charles, stating that the access road is the property of the Village of Cold Spring and not the Town. He also stated that in fairness to Richard Goldsand, (unintelligible) -----

Fred Clarke, resident of Porcelli Road off of Foundry Pond Road, stated that this is an issue of loopholes. He believes that Mr. DeVido has found every loophole in the process to consistently play one board against the other board. When given a violation, they don't follow it. He is pleased to see that the boards are beginning to realize that something is wrong with this project. Not only elected officials are observing this project, but also the citizens of this community are involved to protect it. They don't want to see people taking advantage of loopholes have their way in our community. He, too, asks that the Town Board have Mr. Goldsand retract the latest affidavit.

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Supervisor Mazzuca interjected that he believes that everyone has the right of use for his or her property within reason. However, he feels that this project is very disturbing -- using loopholes to proceed with the project. He acknowledges that it is very difficult to write codes that encompass every aspect.

Mr. Charles, following up on the loophole concept, stated that this project has become a loophole game. However, there is another aspect, which is the access road for the Village of Cold Spring. He went on to say that when the applicant went before the Zoning Board, the original access road had a forty-foot wide easement. If the applicant doesn't have the forty-foot wide easement area, then they don't have enough land for this project. The applicant then gave back a 10 foot easement to the Village, the Zoning Board, as well as some members of the public, realized that a 10-foot wide easement for emergency vehicles was not sufficient. This access road is on steep slopes, as well as hairpin turns, which is not enough room for access. The applicant then offered to keep clear five feet on each side, which now becomes a twenty-foot wide easement, without giving up the land.

Councilman Shea commented that the fact is, for anyone in the Town to get a driveway permit you need twenty-foot frontage, and a legal travel way must be at least fourteen-feet.

Mr. Weinpahl spoke of the old road and noted for the record that the road was never abandoned. The last filed map was from 1939, and it states that the old road passes through properties and ends at the reservoir. That's why the village would have been using it. He noted that nothing since this document has been recorded at the Putnam County Land Records Department. Mr. DeVido's claim is that he has title insurance on it and he now owns it.

Richard Healy, resident of Foundry Pond Road, commented that his issue is the fourth house -- he is not denying Mr. DeVido his enterprise. However, as a full time resident, he is witnessing the potential of a huge impact on the community. He asked the Town Board for their support because he believes this case is setting a precedent. He also pointed out that the applicant has placed trees and put up erosion walls after we brought it to their attention. He believes that everything they are doing is a counter to the residents concerns.

For the record, Councilman Shea stated that he disagreed with what Mr. Goldsand submitted. The subdivision, in his opinion, has been swamped with problems, including the old building removal, the old road and the property to make it a conformed area, and the building permit issues. He also mentioned that the Highway Superintendent had issues with this and hasn't been consulted enough on the project, as he is the one responsible for maintaining the road. Councilman Shea also noted that if there are problems with the town road, it's the problem of the developer not the town.

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Councilman Shea has been in contact with the DEC regarding a Stormwater Management Plan, which Mr. DeVido does not have in place. He requested that the Town Board consider drafting a letter to the DEC addressing this problem, noting that there will be more than an acre disturbance at that site. Supervisor Mazzuca interjected that Barbara Kendall of the DEC made it very clear that disturbance of one acre must have a Stormwater Plan in place.

Mr. Charles stated that they are not denying Mr. DeVido from developing. They only ask that it's a wise development, which addresses the right number of houses, a storm water control plan and proper shrubbery. This would address all the things that the Planning Board said two-years ago.

Supervisor Mazzuca then addressed retracting the affidavit. Town Attorney Doyle stated that if the Town Board so desires, he would convey the wishes of the Town Board to Richard Goldsand.

RESOLUTION #191-07

Councilman Shea pointed out that this is the same LOSAP that has been approved and there have been no increases.

12. Discussion with regard to a letter received from Putnam County Executive Robert Bondi addressing the Fishkill Road Project.

Supervisor Mazzuca read a letter dated July 26, 2007, from County Executive Bondi responding to a request from the Town asking the status of the Fishkill Road Project as follows:

This is in response to your resolution of July 12, 2007, regarding our Fishkill Road/Route 9 intersection project.

The Putnam County Department of Highway & Facilities (PCDHF) has already started this project by working on many essential pre-construction activities since the spring of this year;

- PCDHF staff has been coordinating with local utility companies since May to have them relocate their overhead lines.
- Authorization to proceed under SPDES General Permit No. GP-01-01 was granted by the NYSDEC on June 22, 2007, after an intense effort by our consultant and PCHF staff to meet the permit's requirements.
- A pre-construction meeting was held with NYSDOT staff on June 10, 2007.
- PCDHF has retained Hahn Engineering of Brewster to manage the construction. Hahn has been working with the surveying firm of Badey & Watson of Philipstown to coordinate construction layout, which should begin shortly.

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- PCDHF has been diligently working to purchase the necessary materials that will be needed for this project.

Actual construction work will begin as soon as possible.

As Putnam County forces will be performing most of the work, we will have to break from construction activities for the winter in order to conduct our winter snow and ice program. Therefore, we expect this project to be completed in 2008.

Rest assured that the safety of the public during this project will be the highest priority for our Highway Department. Adequate detours will be established throughout the project and delays for school buses, emergency services, and the general public will be insignificant.

Supervisor Mazzuca noted that he appreciates the response from County Executive Bondi, however, he referenced an article in the Putnam County News, which he found to be very disturbing. Harold Gary flat out said that they don't have the funds to do the project; that funding has been spent on other projects throughout the Town. A question that has never been answered is what happened to the money that had been put aside for this project? The Town had written letters to the State Attorney General and the State Comptroller. The answers we received from them were a carbon copy of the County's response.

Supervisor Mazzuca stated that one thing that is a concern is that the Putnam County Highway Department will be doing the work. Originally, the project was to go to bid. Safety is another concern, in that, if the project begins and the County encounters money problems again, potentially, this project could run into 2009 and beyond. Councilman Shea questioned the attendance record for our County Legislator at town meetings. In all fairness, Supervisor Mazzuca pointed out that our County Legislator was the one who grilled Harold Gary at the Physical Services Meeting. He did ask some hard questions, and the article in the PCNR was based on the conversation that Vinny Tamagna had at that meeting.

Discussion then turned to the Putnam County Highway Department doing the project. Some of the concerns were they are frequently called away to different sites as situations arise and the overall supervision of this project. They also discussed drainage at the site, which is surrounded by wetlands. Based on this discussion, the Town Board has decided to draft a letter to the County expressing their concerns.
